Master Sand Sculptors At Wollaston Beach

Master sand sculptors will create large sand castles at DCR's Wollaston Beach Wednesday and Thursday as part of Save the Harbor/Save the Bay's Better Beaches program before competing in the Revere Beach International Sand Sculpting Festival next week.

Sculptors Abe Waterman of Prince Edward Island, Morgan Rudluff from California and Kevin Crawford from Australia will sculpt a 20-ton sand castle on Wollaston Beach.

The sand drop will occur Wednesday at 8 a.m. The sculptors will work from Wednesday until Thursday at 5 p.m.

The sculpture will be in the vicinity of the yacht clubs.

This year the Revere Beach International Sand Sculpting Festival will be held Friday, July 24 and Saturday, July 25 from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. and from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Sunday, July 26.

This year's event features 10 solo master sand sculptors and five teams of two master sand sculptors competing in the duo competition.

Admission to the Revere festival is free and open to the public.
