Last Tuesday, Save the Harbor/Save the Bay teamed up with the Department of Conservation & Recreation (DCR) and 20 volunteers from Hines for a cleanup at Squantum Point for the 5th year in a row. Geared with gloves, bags and trash pickers, the volunteers removed truckloads of invasive weeds and debris from the trails and shoreline. Since it was founded in 1957, Hines has always been committed to giving back to their community. On Tuesday afternoon their team did just that.

"Today's cleanup gave us the chance to work together as a team with Save the Harbor for a great cause," said Hines Office Manager Kelly Shom. "It's great to help DCR and our community by keeping Squantum Point clean."

At the site, the team collected a total of 15 bags of trash from the trails and shoreline of Squantum Point, a former Naval airfield adjacent to Marina Bay that offers healthy open space with great views of the Boston Skyline and the Boston Harbor Islands.

Save the Harbor/Save the Bay Executive Director, Chris Mancini said that the group is always proud to partner with the enthusiastic volunteers from Hines. "They make it fun to do the hard work it takes to help keep public spaces well maintained for everyone to enjoy," said Mancini.
