Youth Environmental Education Programs

Free programs that connect the region's young people to Boston Harbor, the Boston Harbor Islands, our public beaches, and the marine environment

Save the Harbor / Save the Bay is a non-profit public interest harbor advocacy organization made up of thousands of citizens, as well civic, corporate, cultural and community leaders and scientists, whose mission is to restore and protect Boston Harbor, Massachusetts Bay and the marine environment and share them with the public for everyone to enjoy.

While traditional environmental advocacy is central to our mission, much of our work focuses on connecting the region's youth and teens to the harbor we have worked so hard to restore and protect.

Save the Harbor / Save the Bay's **free** youth environmental education programs combine recreation with hands-on environmental education to bring the Harbor alive for the region's youth and teens.

In the summer, our **Boston Harbor Explorers** and **All Access Boston Harbor** programs create a new generation of stewards for Boston Harbor, the Boston Harbor Islands and the marine environment. In the spring and fall, our **Marine Mammal Safaris** and "**The Treasures of Spectacle Island**" Cruises connect

youth and families from Nahant to Nantasket with Boston Harbor and the Boston Harbor Islands National Park.

In 2012, these free programs connected **13,545** young people from more than 100 youth and community organizations to Boston Harbor and the Harbor Islands, a 25% increase from 2011.

Save the Harbor / Save the Bay's Summer Programs

Since Save the Harbor's youth programs began in 2002, our All Access Boston Harbor and Boston Harbor Explorers programs have connected more than **73,000 youth and teens** to Boston Harbor and the Boston Harbor Islands.

All Access Boston Harbor

Save the Harbor / Save the Bay's All Access Boston Harbor program offers a series of day trips to Georges and Spectacle Islands in the Boston Harbor Islands National Park. Youth and teens start the day with an interactive presentation on the history of Boston Harbor with maritime historian David Coffin at the Bank of America Pavilion. Once on the islands, they have the opportunity to participate in a variety of recreational and educational activities led by Save the Harbor's staff, including hikes, tide pooling, kite flying, exploring historic Fort Warren, taking guided wrack line walks and hunting for archaeological treasures along the island's shorelines. In the spring of 2012, Save the Harbor / Save the Bay entered a partnership with Bay State Cruise Company and began to use their flagship "Provincetown II" as our AABH program boat. This enabled us to add an additional trip each week this summer, and increased our capacity to accommodate larger groups.



Boston Harbor Explorers

Save the Harbor's Boston Harbor Explorers program is an experiential learning program through which Save the Harbor / Save the Bay's marine educators teach area youth and teens to explore the marine environment. In the summer of 2012 the program ran daily at 8 sites around the Harbor, including:

- Black's Creek Sailing Center in Quincy
- Boston Children's Museum
- Camp Harbor View on Long Island
- Community Boating on the Charles River
- Constitution Beach in East Boston
- Courageous Sailing Center in Charlestown
- Harry McDonough Sailing Center in South Boston
- Piers Park Sailing Center in East Boston



Youth and teens from across the region explored the Harbor using fishing rods, lobster and crab traps, dip nets, magnifying glasses, field guides, water quality testing kits, and underwater cameras. Alongside our team of Senior Harbor Educators, college aged Lead Explorers and high school-aged Junior Program Assistants, children and teens experience the recreational benefits of the Harbor while gaining a better understanding of the marine life that lives within it.

In 2012, we introduced two additional curricula: "Citizen Science: Ocean Invaders", which focuses on the impact of the Asian Shore Crab and other invasive species on native shellfish, lobsters and the marine environment, and our "Beachcombers" program, which engages participants in the search for historic artifacts like sea glass and pottery shards as well as other flotsam, jetsam and trash that tell the story of Boston Harbor's history.



Spring Marine Mammal Safaris & Fall "Treasures of Spectacle Island" Cruises

Each Spring, Save the Harbor runs a series of half-day safaris to the outer Harbor Islands, where families and youth groups join the search for the seals and porpoises that call the Harbor home. In the Fall, kids and families from Nahant to Nantasket join us for weekend day trips to Spectacle Island and enjoy treasure hunting on the beach, hiking to the Island's summits and learning about the Island's history.
